RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN ASSESSMENT AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

Knowledge and understanding of the subject matter is assessed using a mixture of presentation, group discussion, written submission, and multiple choice and short answer exam questions. The ability to work collaboratively and creatively to build a presentation of a group view is seen as a valid demonstration of commitment to mastering the subject matter. There are five assessment components: a group report, a group presentation in class, an individual assignment, a mid-term exam and a final exam. Together the assessment tasks cover the unit. **Please Note: You must pass the final exam to pass the unit.**

Group Assignment 30% (total)

This is a group exercise – all members of the group are expected to contribute actively and substantially. While it is understood that some members of the group may provide more input in the research area whereas others may do more of the actual written work, the group will be required to acknowledge that all group members have given quality time to the project. Your group members will be allocated in class – week 3. The assessment criteria will be distributed in class in Week 4 – your report will be required by beginning of class in

Week 12. Late submission of the Group Report will incur a penalty of 10% of the value of the assignment for every day that it is late. In class presentations will occur in weeks 12 and 13 lectures and weeks 11, 12 and 13 Tutorials

Individual Assignment - 10%

Each student will be required in this unit.to submit a 1,000 word analytical comment. This assignment will be discussed in Week 2, and responses will be required in Week 9. No late submissions will be accepted.

Mid-Term Examination - 20%

The mid-term exam will be a multiple choice (closed book) format. It will be held in class in Week 7.

Final Examination - 40%

The final exam will be held in the formal examination period. The examination will be "closed book". It may contain a multiple choice section as well as a written section addressing the whole of the unit. Further details will be given later in the semester regarding format and content. You must pass the final exam to pass the unit.

All group work is peer moderated

In Week 13, the last class, each student will submit a peer evaluation assessment for each member in their group (including themselves). This will then allow a peer factor to be allocated to the Group's raw score for each individual student, allowing a dispersion of marks within the same group. This peer factor is kept confidential

The University examination period in Semester 2 is from 19 Nov to 5 Dec, 2008

You are expected to present yourself for examination at the time and place designated in the University Examination Timetable. The timetable will be available in Draft form approximately eight weeks before the commencement of the examinations and in Final form approximately four weeks before the commencement of the examinations. http://www.timetables.mq.edu.au/exam

The only exception to not sitting an examination at the designated time is because of documented illness or unavoidable disruption. If a Supplementary Examination is granted as a result of the Special Consideration process the examination will be scheduled after the conclusion of the official examination period.

You are advised that it is Macquarie University policy not to set early examinations for individuals or groups of students. All students are expected to ensure that they are available until the end of the teaching semester, that is the final day of the official examination period.

PLAGIARISM

UNIVERSITY POLICY ON GRADING

Academic Senate has a set of guidelines on the distribution of grades across the range from fail to high distinction. Your final result will include one of these grades plus a standardised numerical grade (SNG).

On occasion your raw mark for a unit (i.e., the total of your marks for each assessment item) may not be the same as the SNG which you receive. Under the Senate guidelines, results may be scaled to ensure that there is a degree of comparability across the university, so that units with the same past performances of their students should achieve similar results.

It is important that you realise that the policy does not require that a minimum number of examiners to explain their actions if more than 20% of students fail in a unit.

The process of scaling does not change the order of marks among students. A student who receives a higher raw mark than another will also receive a higher final scaled mark.
