ABOUT THIS UNIT

Students will gain an in depth understating of the laws relevant to trade within the European Union (EU) as well as the global impact of the Union itself on world trade.

This unit introduces students to the structure and laws of the EU and has the following principal aims:

- 1) to enable students to understand the particular trading aspect of each member state and what they saw as the benefits to be gained by joining the EU.
2. to introduce students to the major treaties that have bought about the European Union and their effect on member states and gain an understanding of the role of the main institutions responsible for running the EU and for drafting the laws.
3. to enable students to understand the dynamics of internal and external trade law in the Union.
- 4.Non economic laws in place to protect the environment and ensure the sustainability of resources are debated.
- 5.The current crisis with the Euro zone will form a prominent part of this unit.
