## ASSESSMENT

Formal assessment for this unit will be:

1. Mid-semester examination	20%
2. Individual hand-in assignment	20%
3. Final Examination	60%

In order to pass the unit, **both** the following criteria must be satisfied:

- Submission of a well presented assignment
- Minimum performance of 45% in the mid semester examination and 50% in the final examination.

### MID-SEMESTER EXAMINATION

- The exam will cover all material up to and including the end of **Week 5**. It will be of **2 hours** duration.
- In the examination you will be provided with relevant tables but no formulae will be given. However, you will be able to bring into the examination **one piece of paper up to A4 size** on which you may write anything you like on **one side only**.

### INDIVIDUAL HAND-IN ASSIGNMENT

The assignment provides an opportunity for you to gain experience in the techniques and concepts. It will be given out on **15<sup>th</sup> October (week 10)** and due at the lecture on **29<sup>th</sup> October (week 12)**.

Assignments must be handed in at the lecture on the due date.

For each day late, 20% of the potential assignment marks will be deducted.

Please keep a copy of your assignment before you submit.

### FINAL EXAMINATION

- The final examination will cover all topics dealt within the unit.
- In this examination you will be provided with relevant tables but no formulae will be given. However, you will be able to bring into the examination **one piece of paper up to A4 size** on which you may write anything you like on **both sides**. Any photocopied or computer printed sheets are forbidden. No other notes or books are allowed.

You are expected to present yourself for examination at the time and place designated in the University Examination Timetable. ## UNIVERSITY POLICY ON GRADING

Academic Senate has a set of guidelines on the distribution of grades across the range from fail to high distinction. Your final result will include one of these grades plus a standardised numerical grade (SNG).

Your raw mark for a unit (i.e., the total of your marks for each assessment item, including the final examination) may not be the same as the SNG which you receive. Under the Senate guidelines, results may be scaled to ensure that there is a degree of comparability across the university, so that units with the same past performances of their students should achieve similar results.

It is important that you realise that the policy does not require that a minimum number of students are to be failed in any unit. In fact it does something like the opposite, in requiring examiners to explain their actions if more than 20% of students fail in a unit.

The process of scaling does not change the order of marks among students. A student who receives a higher raw mark than another will also receive a higher final scaled mark.
